Dear Letters Editor,

The March 5 editorial “A new round of repression in Hong Kong” is unjustified and totally ignores the reality of Hong Kong’s legal and judicial system.

Everyone in Hong Kong is equal before the law. Prosecutorial decisions made by our Department of Justice are based on evidence and made without fear or favor. Cases are handled in the same manner irrespective of the political beliefs, requests and background of the persons involved. In adjudicating cases, our independent courts are concerned only with the law.

The former Chief Justice of Canada, Beverley McLachlin, recently attested to the integrity of our courts and the high caliber of our judges. Currently serving as a non-permanent judge of our Court of Final Appeal, Madam Justice McLachlin expressed confidence that the body is immune to outside pressure.

Hong Kong’s common law system is internationally recognized. The city ranks second in Asia and eighth in the world for judicial independence by the World Economic Forum. It also ranks second in Asia and 14th in the world for rule of law by the World Bank.

Hong Kong people have constitutional rights and protections, which are underpinned by our judicial system. Hong Kong can count on its courts and its people to vigorously uphold the rule of law.
